

# RightsCon 2025 Report: Advancing Human Rights in the Digital Age

The 13th edition of the global summit on human rights in the digital age, **RightsCon 2025**, was held in **Taipei**, **Taiwan**, from **February 24 to 27**, **2025**, at the **Taipei International Conference Center (TICC)** and online, organised by Access Now. This was the first time the hybrid summit was hosted on the Asian continent, drawing over **10,000 participants from 150 countries**. Attendees included **activists, technologists, policymakers, journalists, philanthropists, researchers, business leaders, and artists**, engaging in more than **450 sessions** exploring the intersection of **human rights and technology**.

Taipei, the beautiful and vibrant capital of Taiwan with a rich blending indigenous culture, Chinese influence and modern innovation was originally inhabited by the Ketagalan people. # The Significance of RightsCon for IRISE and CSOs

RightsCon is recognized as the **leading global conference** addressing human rights challenges in the digital era. For organizations like **IRISE** and **civil society organizations (CSOs)** working on **gender equality, gender-based violence (GBV), and sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR)**, the summit provided a critical platform to explore solutions, strengthen networks, and drive impactful advocacy. The **discussions on misinformation, online safety, digital inclusion, and feminist technologies** are particularly relevant for advancing the rights of **women and marginalized communities in Nigeria and beyond**.

## **Key Sessions and Insights**

#### **Opening Ceremony (February 24, 2025)**

The conference was inaugurated at 9:00 AM in the Plenary Hall of TICC, with an official welcome speech by Nikki Gladstone, RightsCon Director, alongside other notable speakers such as Raman Jit Singh Chima (Asia Policy Director, Access Now), Alejandro Mayoral Baños (Executive Director, Access Now), Adriana Fernández Calderón (RightsCon Senior Community Engagement Coordinator), and Hsiao Bi-khim (Vice President of Taiwan).

#### Sessions Relevant to Gender Equality, GBV, and SRHR

- Silenced and Misled: The Twin Threats of Misinformation and Censorship in SRHR This session examined the increasing challenges of misinformation and censorship surrounding sexual and reproductive health and rights, highlighting actionable strategies for activists, policymakers, and media professionals to combat digital misinformation and ensure access to accurate health information.
- Mapping and Mitigating Online Gender-Based Violence in Africa Led by KICTANet, this session explored the prevalence, trends, and consequences of online GBV, offering insights into policy interventions and digital safety measures for women and girls in Africa.
- From Paint to Deepfakes: Intimate-Image Abuse Harming Women and Gender-Diverse People in Latin America

A critical discussion on the **misuse of deepfake technology and non-consensual image sharing**, which disproportionately affects **women and LGBTQ+ individuals**, and strategies to promote **legal protections and digital literacy**.

• Anticolonial, Feminist, and Global South-Centered Digital Technologies: Placing Care at the Center

This session emphasized feminist approaches to digital technology, exploring peer-learning models, safety protocols, and the importance of integrating care, solidarity, and movement-building in digital advocacy.

• What Strategies Can Prevent Online Hate from Fueling Offline Violence Against HIV-Affected Communities?

This session examined how **online discrimination and hate speech** can escalate into **real-world violence**, particularly against **HIV-affected individuals**, and discussed **digital advocacy strategies to counter stigmatization**.

• Empowering NGOs and Activists with Essential Cybersecurity Tools As digital activism grows, the risk of cyber threats also increases. This session provided hands-on training for NGOs and activists to enhance their digital security and protect sensitive information.
